"I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will strike at your head, while you strike at his heel." (Genesis 3:15, NABRE)

The Protoevangelium

The term **Protoevangelium**, derived from the Greek words *proto* (meaning "first") and *evangelion* (meaning "gospel" or "good news"), refers to the first announcement of the Gospel found in the Bible. This concept is primarily associated with **Genesis 3:15**, considered a foundational text for the Christian understanding of redemption.

Scriptural Basis

In Genesis 3:15 (NABRE), God addresses the serpent after the Fall of Adam and Eve, stating:

"I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will strike at your head, while you strike at his heel."

Explanation of the Protoevangelium

Context of the Passage:

• The Protoevangelium occurs after Adam and Eve disobey God by eating from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. Following their disobedience, God pronounces consequences for their actions, including the introduction of sin and death into the world. In this context, the Protoevangelium serves as a ray of hope amidst the judgment.

Meaning of the Text:

- Enmity: God declares that there will be hostility between the serpent (representing evil and sin) and the woman, which can be understood as Eve, but is often interpreted by Christians as Mary, the mother of Jesus.
- **Offspring**: The "offspring" of the woman refers to humanity, culminating in Jesus Christ, who is seen as the fulfillment of this promise.
- Strike at the Head and Heel: The phrase indicates a prophetic struggle between good and evil. The serpent will strike at the heel of the woman's offspring, which symbolizes a temporary injury, while the offspring will ultimately crush the serpent's head, symbolizing a definitive victory over sin and death.

Theological Significance:

- **Promise of Redemption**: The Protoevangelium is viewed as the first hint of God's plan for salvation through Jesus Christ. It foreshadows the coming of a Redeemer who will defeat sin and restore humanity's relationship with God.
- Mary's Role: In Catholic theology, the Protoevangelium is often seen as a reference to Mary, emphasizing her unique role in salvation history as the mother of the Messiah.
- **Hope** Amidst Judgment: This passage highlights God's mercy and His desire to redeem humanity, offering hope that despite the Fall, salvation is possible.

The Protoevangelium is significant in Christian theology as it encapsulates the essence of God's redemptive plan for humanity. It lays the groundwork for understanding the necessity of Christ's coming and the ultimate triumph of good over evil, which is a central theme throughout Scripture. The interpretation of Genesis 3:15 as the first proclamation of the Gospel continues to be a foundational element in the Church's teaching on salvation and redemption.
